Pastor’s Perspective

“By Name I have called you. By name I will be with you. By name I have appointed you to speak in my name.” This song by John Michael Talbot has a strong message for us about who we are and what we are asked to do. What does this call mean for us and how do we answer it?

Our theme for this year’s **Day of Reflection** is answering our baptismal call. We have invited Sr. **Barbara Moore to be our presenter**. Sr. Barbara has been a Sister of Mercy for over 40 years. She taught secondary school and has many years of pastoral experience in both jail and parish ministry. Sr. Barbara earned her doctorate in preaching at McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago in 2004. She teaches at Rochester Colgate Divinity School. Preaching and retreat work have always been her love and are central to her ministry.

This year we have set aside Saturday, October 28 for our morning of reflection. Registration is at 9:00am in the gathering space. Our program will begin at 9:15am and will conclude by 12:30pm.

Our day together will explore the power, depth and impact of the sacrament of Holy Baptism. It may be the least understood sacrament of the seven, yet it is the most foundational. Through presentations, quiet reflection time, and shared experiences we hope to deepen our understanding of this wonderful sacrament and renew our commitment to the message and Gospel of Jesus Christ in our community and world.

Anyone who serves in any kind of ministry, whether it be as sacristan, music ministry, breakfast club, or any other ministry/volunteer/steward position that serves to bring life to St. Rita parish is encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity. It is a wonderful chance to gather with each other for social, spiritual, and personal growth. We will have light refreshments. We ask that you sign up either in back of church or **call the parish office at 671-1100 by Friday, October 20** to let us know you are coming so we can plan accordingly.

Our hope is that this experience will enrich your own faith journey as you continue to so generously serve St. Rita’s parish. There aren’t words that can express how much we appreciate all you do to make St. Rita’s so alive and welcoming. May God bless you as you answer God’s call. Hope to see you there.

HISTORY OF THE SACRAMENTS – PART 2

The Protestant Reformation challenged the magical quality that had evolved in the history of the sacraments in the Catholic Church. Luther and Calvin emphasized the need for an experience of God’s grace as an essential element in the reception of a sacrament. The sacrament must be grasped and accepted in a personal act of faith. The Council of Trent (1545-63) responded to the charges of Luther by first stating that there were 7 official sacraments. Importantly, the bishops at Trent noted that the measure of the grace received is dependent on the faith of the recipient. This declaration answered the Protestant charge that the sacraments had become magical in the ritual and experience of the Church and its people.

A transforming renewal of Catholic sacramentology occurred with the Second Vatican Council in the early 1960’s. In its “Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy,” the council urged the pastors to lead the people to a full and active participation in the rites of the Church. They were to also make the rites more intelligible to eliminate any suggestion of magic in their performance. As the document develops, we see that Jesus as a man incarnated the redeeming love of God in human form. His actions, then, were manifestations of God’s love for man and in themselves possess a divine saving power and thus cause grace. Today we can encounter Jesus in the historical, tangible reality of his body, the Church, and in the historical, visible and tangible sacraments, which are the embodiment of his heavenly saving actions.

Upon analyzing sacramental theology before the council, William Bausch states that sacraments were no longer viewed as celebrating actions between God and man. The mystery was stripped to the bare essentials and they became rigid rubrics and laws. This led to the sacraments being viewed as possessions rather than gifts, to be dispensed by the church and specialists. The celebrating community took a back seat to this development. Bausch then discussed grace as a divine action, an encounter, not a divine product packaged and delivered on demand in the sacraments. In his view, sacraments activate past and present saving actions of God in Jesus. He uses Baptism as his example. When we attend a Baptism, we remember Jesus’ Baptism in the waters of the Jordan River, his anointing by the Spirit. The remembering brings those events into the here and now actions of the Baptism being celebrated.

The United States bishops stated: “sacraments are the principal actions through which Christ gives his Spirit to Christians and makes them a holy people.” Bausch contends that sacraments should reveal through ritual and bring us in touch with the power which is God. Its ritual must possess power to shake individuals in their deepest insides and pull them into the mystery of God’s presence in the world. We as the celebrating community must be active and make present his saving actions now in our sacramental experience.

Sacramental preparation is a parish-based process which means it does not take place in the Catholic School or the Religious Education Program. Once you have registered, you will receive a letter letting you know when the parent meeting will take place. Children who are seven years old are eligible for the Sacraments of First Reconciliation, First Eucharist and Confirmation.
